

# Choosing the Best School for Your Child with





Parents have many questions after their child receives a formal dyslexia diagnosis. One of those questions is:

Will my child's needs be met in his or her current school?

Advocating for your dyslexic child is one of your most important opportunities as a parent. A big part of that is choosing the best learning environment — one that is set up to maximize potential for dyslexic students.

There are many options at hand, and dyslexia can range from mild or moderate to severe. Choosing a school that is the best fit begins with understanding your child's unique abilities and challenges. From there, you can begin to identify specific educational needs and possible gaps in his or her current learning environment.

This booklet was created to help you understand what to look for when weighing school options. From ideal class sizes to accessible tutoring services, you'll learn what dyslexic students need to thrive.

#### **Dyslexia Defined**

Dyslexia is a language-based learning disorder characterized by frequent errors in word recognition, a lack of fluency (or "smoothness") when reading, and poor spelling and decoding abilities. These difficulties stem from a deficit in the phonological (sound system) component of language, despite having the cognitive ability to learn.

## Before a child is diagnosed with dyslexia, parents may notice them:

- Struggling to detect and manipulate sounds in words that are heard
- Having difficulty learning the sound/symbol relationships essential for sounding out words
- Relying on memorization, sight word reading, and/or guessing when it comes to reading words
- Becoming frustrated when reading or being reluctant to read
- Suffering from feelings of inadequacy or low self-confidence around peers
- Displaying feelings of anxiety or depression, or acting out as a result of challenges





## Children with dyslexia often have difficulty with:

- Reading
- Writing
- Spelling
- Speech
- Pronouncing larger words
- Rhyming
- Memorization of math facts and multiplication tables
- Sequences, such as tying shoelaces
- · Learning right and left

## Dyslexia is:

#### **Prevalent**

Most studies indicate that 5 - 10% of the entire population has dyslexia, but the actual numbers may be higher.

Dyslexia is by far the most common learning disability.

Some of history's most successful adults — Einstein, Thomas Edison, and Benjamin Franklin — were dyslexic.



#### **Permanent**

Children do not grow out of dyslexia; however, with the right intervention, hard work and support, they can overcome or manage associated reading problems.

#### **Phonological Deficits**

Dyslexia affects the phonological module of the brain where sounds are put together to form words (and where words are broken down into sounds).

Dyslexic students use only the right side of the brain to process language, while non-dyslexics use both right and left.

If your child struggles with dyslexia, finding the optimal learning environment is vital. Here are a few important areas to examine:

## Intensive, Specialized Instruction

- Small class sizes
- Explicit, daily, one-on-one or small group specialized tutoring to address phonological weaknesses
- Close progress monitoring to respond to the unique learning profiles of individual students

#### **Expert Educators**

- Teachers who have expertise in helping students learn how to overcome the challenges associated with dyslexia
- Clinically trained tutors available for daily intervention
- Targeted intervention to develop reading skills and maximize opportunities to access the curriculum

#### **Challenging Curriculum**

- Lessons tailored to the learning profile of your child
- A rigorous on-grade-level curriculum
- Brain-based training that strengthens phonemic awareness and the ability to sound out words for efficient reading

### The Life-Changing Impacts of Tutoring




#### A Multisensory Approach
